From the Editor

Dear Readers.

Welcome to the Spring 2023 issue of Salhouse Saga.

We've got a very full magazine again this issue. Plans are being made for a Coronation Celebration event at the Recreation Ground on May 7th. This is still in the early stages, see page 26. There is also exciting news about the proposed new Medical Centre in Rackheath, see page 15.

A period of change: the few months since the last issue of SAGA have seen a number of changes in and around Salhouse, particularly in the field of retail activities. The much loved café and craft shop, Prima Rosa, who only late last year won a Good Food award, sadly closed its doors for the last time in December after seven successful years. The owners quoted approaching retirement age plus the inevitable energy costs as the reasons for calling it a day. On the positive side, the newly established Black Barn Farm, with its range of farm related retail businesses, on Norwich Road, was recently listed in the EDP as hosting one of the best Farmers' Markets in Norfolk. Congratulations to them.

Two very 'public' closures in December saw both Salhouse's pubs closed over Christmas, but both are set to re-open in the Spring under new ownership and management. They each intend to present a slightly different 'offer' so hopefully Salhouse will be blessed with two successful pubs in the village, (see the update report on page 34). At a time when pubs are closing everywhere, we are very lucky to have the prospect of two.

Sadly, the Salhouse Baptist Chapel in Chapel Loke has closed. The reason for this is simply a decline in numbers attending over the last two years, attributed in part to the advancing age of many of its members. The chapel first opened in 1802 and has had many ups and downs since then, including closures and loss of congregation, so maybe it will re-open again at some time in the future. We wish Simon and Jane success in their next venture and thank them for their contribution to life in Salhouse.

From The Parish Council



This year is an election year for the Parish Council. Local elections occur every four years, but for different councils in different years; this year is our turn. Election Day is Thursday 4th May. Councillors can join or leave the Council at any time, subject to vacancies, but in an election year, all the seats on the Parish Council are up for re-election. Nominations open on Friday 17th March and close on Tuesday 4th April. However, there will not be an actual ballot unless there are at least 12 candidates for the 11 seats available. If you ever considered joining the Parish Council, this is a great opportunity.

Please note, commencing this year, everyone will now need **photo ID in order to vote**. Further information on photo ID can be found on District and Parish Council websites.

You may have read in the press just recently that the PC has been successful again in obtaining 50/50 County funding for minor highways improvements. This does mean, however, that we have to find the other 50% before these schemes can go ahead! Schemes for which we obtained funding last year, most notably 'trod' paths on parts of Honeycombe Road and Thieves Lane, have got funding already and should be constructed in the course of 2023. One of last year's projects which is already up and running is the additional 'SAM-2' speed monitor which you may see installed on the new 40 mph speed limit on Norwich Road.

The PC has been following closely the Planning Application for the **North Rackheath Development**, part of which falls within our Parish. We are keenly awaiting comments from the County Highways which are many months overdue. Other issues which are also awaited are the solutions to objections regarding mineral extraction on site and the **'Nutrient Neutrality'** issue, which is still unresolved. SPC has created a **Working Group** of councillors and residents to look into this application (see p.12).

Salhouse now has a new road name since the District Council has given the name 'Hewetson Close' to the development of four self-build homes to the rear of Lower Street. This name was chosen from a list of suggestions submitted by the Parish Council, and follows the pattern of naming roads in Salhouse after historical figures of local significance. It refers to Capt. Philip Hewetson, whose name is on the Salhouse War Memorial, and whose letters from the trenches of WW1 are preserved at the Norfolk Records Office.

The Parish Council met with the school and local Police Beat Manager to look at **parking issues on Cheyney Avenue** particularly during school drop off and pick up times. Although the PC has investigated with Highways what improvements could be made, including the repainting of the yellow zigzag lines, the best result is for all to be courteous not to block or obstruct residents driveways (even if just for a short period) nor park on verges. The safety of the children is priority and therefore would appreciate you support with this.

We have received a number of comments on the condition of the car park at the Recreation Ground. We are looking into ways in which this can be improved, and how those improvements can be funded and also looking at the possibility of installing some new younger children's play equipment.

Finally, we are pleased to report that the roundabout at the children's playground is working well again, after a long wait for new bearings. Here, our junior engineer is seen checking for play in the roundabout bearings

Update from your County and District Councillors Fran Whymark and Martin Murrell

Locally we were pleased to see the Bell and Lodge getting a new lease of life. I hope that the whole community can give them both the support they need to become thriving businesses again. Likewise, the lease is now available at the Sole and Heel, let's hope that too will be come a destination for local people soon.

At Broadland District Council (BDC) the Council have agreed that Council Tax will be frozen again to help our residents. This has only been possible due to good financial management over many years and I am confident this can continue in the future.

Norfolk County Council (NCC) are also offering help through the Norfolk Assistance Scheme, call 0344 800 8020 or go to: www.norfolk.gov.uk and click the link 'Help with living costs'.

NCC have agreed a 4.99% increase in their part of the Council Tax. This is due to inflationary pressures, not least the additional costs of Adult Social Care (ASC). 2% of the increase will be ringfenced for ASC, with the other 2.99% supporting a general increase.

NCC and Central Government have agreed a County Deal in principle. This would transfer funding and powers to Norfolk, allowing decisions previously made in Whitehall to be devolved to Norfolk, so Norfolk people can make decisions for Norfolk. The Deal would release funding for infrastructure, housing, employment, adult education and transport planning. There is a public consultation until 20th March. To share your views go to www.norfolk.gov.uk and follow the link for 'Norfolk County Deal', email haveyoursay@norfolk.gov.uk or call 0344 800 8020.

A reminder that we have Parish and District Council elections on 4th May this year. Maybe this is the time to think about joining your Parish Council? If you need to you can register to vote at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote, all you need is your National Insurance number. When you come out to vote from 4th May onwards you will need photo identification (ID). Most people will have a driving licence or passport (or another acceptable form of ID) but if you do not you can get free photo ID by going to www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate. You can also follow the links at www.southnorfolkandbroadland.gov.uk/elections, to register to vote, get your voter ID or register for a postal vote.



North Rackheath Development (GT16) Working Group

It is acknowledged that the North Rackheath Development (GT16) is a significant development that has the potential to impact on a number of residents and businesses within Salhouse and the surrounding areas.



Everyone has the opportunity to submit comments directly to Broadland District Council planning application via the planning portal, but Salhouse Parish Council (SPC) are keen to ensure that the views of all Salhouse residents are heard and that residents are kept informed of the progress of this development.

As a result, SPC has initiated a Working Group and are looking for Salhouse residents to be part of this group. The objectives of this working group are to:

- Monitor plans/actions/activities by the various stakeholders for the proposed development and provide comment/observations (via recommendations to Salhouse Parish Council (SPC)) in this regard.
- Remain fair and neutral in all its activities and ensure the views and needs of all parishioners are considered equally with regards to any recommendations made to the SPC.

The Working Group will submit a report monthly to the SPC and will be available on the SPC website. Regular updates will also be made via the SAGA.

Health Matters – Spring 2023



An occasional update from Hoveton & Wroxham Medical Centre

Minor Injury Service—During our normal opening hours (0830 – 1800), we can care for patients with minor injuries, who would otherwise need to attend A&E. Our team can deal with the following: cuts/lacerations (capable of simple closure), minor trauma (sprains), minor dislocations, foreign objects, superficial eye injury, minor head injury (no loss of consciousness), minor burns/scolds (less than 4cm, not involving hands, feet, face, neck).

Hanging on the Telephone? - Unless you need urgent advice, you are advised to use our website to seek help for a health problem. Our well-trained Reception team will then identify the right person to solve your health problem. Our GPs have tasked our receptionists to ask about the nature of the health problem so that you can be helped in the most effective and efficient way. Please cooperate with our reception team.

Payment Options—Some private health checks and other correspondence prepared by a GP attracts a fee. Due to our bank's high processing charge we are no longer able to accept payment by cheque. Payment can be made by cash or via debit/credit card.

Tackling Winter Pressures—With our partners in North Norfolk Primary Care (NNPC) we are offering increased capacity with the introduction in February of an Acute Respiratory Infection clinic on Mondays at Hoveton & Wroxham Medical Centre. This also operates at neighbouring practices, and we may well request that you attend other surgeries if you can. NNPC are also providing a home visiting service to complement our visiting GPs, to help us reduce hospital admissions and attend to newly discharged patients with complex care needs.

Let's Reduce Waste — Appointments and medicines are valuable. Most of our patients are generally very good at attending appointments on time. That said, every appointment counts and there were 226 missed appointments in January 2023 — some 5% of appointments. This is equivalent to more than 40 hours - a whole week of GP or nurse time. Financially this amounts to at least £50,000 a year wasted. Please help us reduce this waste. We are also asking patients to help reduce medicine wastage — a huge cost to the NHS. In particular, please don't stockpile and do not reorder from repeat lists unless you know that you will run out.

Your Patient Participation Group Needs You—The PPG meets bi-monthly and provides valuable feedback to the Manager and GP partners of Hoveton & Wroxham Medical Centre. All matters affecting the service we provide to patients are addressed together with future changes. If you can spare an hour of your time, please get in contact.



NEW MEDICAL CENTRE IN RACKHEATH – UPDATE

The Background -After years of planning, we are close to realising the prospect of a new medical centre in Rackheath. The Centre will be a Primary Care Health Hub and host GP and other primary care services such as community district nursing team, physiotherapy and mental health support services. The Hoveton & Wroxham Medical Centre Practice Manager, Chris Stace, and an NHS Estates lead representative (Paul Higham) presented plans to locals at The Pavilion in Rackheath on 14 June 2022. We will repeat this presentation once the final approvals have been granted mid-next year.

The Approvals Process—The Department of Health and Social Care gave conditional 'programme approval' in September. This has allowed the final and full business case for the new medical centre to proceed. There remains some small risk to the project as the financial limits are fixed and inflation is having an effect. NHS Property Services are managing the project and Darwin Group are the chosen builders. Detailed building design has commenced and District Council planning activity is running in parallel.

The Building - The fixed target of having the Centre operational in mid-2024 means that modern methods of construction (MMC) will be used. Much of the building will be constructed off-site and then assembled on-site, which is on Broad Lane to the west of the rail crossing. MMC will allow for an attractive exterior design and good environment for patients and staff.

The Patients – Registration—The location of the new Centre is within the boundaries of several current GP practices in North Norfolk and East Norwich. A carefully timed and managed process of practice boundary changes will take place to ensure that the Centre can be used for the convenience of patients in the area, for example, Hoveton & Wroxham Medical Centre patients 'south of the Wroxham bridge' in Rackheath and Salhouse, and those in villages and new houses around the NDR. Timely recruitment will ensure a good quality service is available for patients from day one, expanding at the pace of growing demand, with the building have a long-term capacity of 10,000.

The Operation The NHS Integrated Care Board (ICB) for Norfolk & Waveney (the old CCG) will own the new building and operational management will be delegated to Hoveton & Wroxham Medical Centre for effective and efficient use of the Centre as patient numbers grow over the coming years. General Practice is seeing an ever-increasing range of specialist clinicians to meet patient needs: GPs, trainee GPs, various nursing specialities, pharmacists & pharmacy technicians, physios, mental health councillors and more. Norfolk Community Health and Care district nurse and associated clinics will operate from the Centre, and we envisage some NNUH and other health care clinics being run for the convenience of patients. This does not include additional dentistry services for the time being.







Salhouse Baptist Chapel

After approximately 220 years, the chapel has closed. A good deal of the earlier history was recorded in chapter 8 of 'The Book of Salhouse and Woodbastwick', the excellent volume on the village history. Whilst there have been good periods of large congregations, perhaps numbering 150 or so for some of the 19th century, there have been many years where the chapel has struggled for lack of attendees. Indeed, I remember being brought in the 1970s as a teenager by my father who was amongst a group of men in Suffolk determined to keep the chapel open. A quick glance at the records reveals that for quite a significant part of the 20th century, there were frequent gaps when the chapel wasn't open.

But, its not the end of the church, nor indeed was it the beginning when the first group of a dozen or so met in 1802 to construct a place of worship in the village. The Bible reminds us that the church isn't the building, but the people. And the church began at the day of Pentecost, as recorded in Acts 2, when Peter's remarkable sermon was delivered with astounding results. Not just the 3,000 converted on that occasion, but it was the seed of the church, and 2,000 years later people are meeting across the world. Some in elaborate buildings, some in tin huts, some in homes, some amongst vast numbers, others a small handful. In 2019 I was privileged to spend a few weeks in Africa teaching pastors from war-torn South Sudan. I remember one man very well; he addresses a congregation of over 100 each week, and they meet under a tree.

But here in Salhouse, the declining number was something we wrestled with throughout 2022. We had to face the reality that there was a lack of local interest, and we recognise that we are in the fortunate position where there is still freedom to meet, and a relatively large number of congregations can be found within a short drive.

There is more good news. Even though a building has closed, the good news of the gospel, salvation in Jesus Christ, is still preached, proclaimed and gossiped and this is still a day of opportunity. Isaiah 55v6 tells us to "seek the Lord while he may be found". Perhaps you've left it, put it to the back of your mind, thought there'll always be another day. Well, Peter reminds us not to trade on the patience of God, 2 Peter 3v9.

And the church, worldwide, is larger today than at any time in history. The words of Jesus in Matthew 16v18 are true: he is building his church, and nothing will prevent its accomplishment.

The message preached, the good news proclaimed, the salvation of Jesus Christ hasn't changed, not one bit. Just not in the old building up the Loke. But he is still to be found.

For the moment, I'm in the village and I'd be pleased to speak with anyone who would like to chat further and find what they're missing.

Update on Salhouse Pubs

Both Salhouse's village pubs changed hands late last year and both closed for refurbishment. This meant a rather 'dry' Christmas for those who would prefer to venture out locally. The good news is that both pubs should re-open under new management in the coming months.

The Salhouse Lodge, in Vicarage Road, has been taken on by Colchester Inns. Nicola Colchester, who will run the business, reports that the pub and hotel, which is currently being redecorated, will reopen in phases from mid-April. The bar and rooms will open first, with



the restaurant opening at a later date. Elements of the existing pub will be kept, such as the sofas, but refurbished to match the 'modern, country feel' of the group's other pubs. The large garden and patio area will continue to host live music, which was much-loved by locals, the bar area will be made more for drinkers, and campers will still be welcome on the pub's seven acres of land.

The Salhouse Bell Inn was bought by Lester Bayfield, owner of Salhouse Hall, just before Christmas. He reports that the building was in a much poorer structural condition than he anticipated, and as a



result, much more extensive renovation work has been required, with the roof having been entirely renewed recently. As an historic buildings restorer, he has the right skills for the task. When completed, there will be a comfortable drinking area, good value restaurant food and takeaways, and the traditional beer garden will be available as always in the summer. The upstairs accommodation is being converted into four holiday lets. Due to the new owner wanting to do a proper job of restoring this historic building, the re-opening date has not yet been decided, but is likely to be some time in May.



Salhouse Station Group is working to ensure the long-term survival of the remaining building at the railway station, constructed in the 1890s.

As previously reported in *Salhouse Saga*, the first job for us is to have the building surveyed to ascertain its condition so we can put a costed plan together to get, firstly, the building made watertight, before starting to restore it so that it can be put to community use as well as potentially providing better facilities for railway passengers.

So, what has been happening? Sadly, there's not much to report yet as progress has been rather frustratingly slow, largely because we have been unable to gain access to the building. However, thanks to our friends at SAVE Britain's Heritage, who first brought the plight of the building to our attention, we are very hopeful that their surveyor will be able to enter the building over the next few months.

This will enable us to get the campaign to restore the station going, set some targets and milestones and start fundraising in earnest.

Our group continues to meet regularly: we have a lot of ideas around what we can do with the station, how it can be used for a community benefit and even encourage more people to use the station. Once we know the condition and what needs doing urgently, we will be able to let the brakes off and launch the project in earnest.

Having met lots of villagers at the Christmas Fair in the Jubilee Hall, we will be supporting the **King's Coronation** event in the village in May and look forward to meeting more people to tell them about our plans. See you there!

How to Grow Vegetables – A beginners guide to growing your own

Growing your own vegetables is rewarding, healthy and fun. But it can be daunting knowing how and where to start.

It's best to grow things that need little attention, can be ready to harvest in a short time, and suffer few pests and diseases. These include courgettes, beans, beetroot, rocket, radish, chillies and potatoes.



How to grow Vegetables

- Most vegetables like a sheltered, sunny spot. Salad leaves and some herbs, can bolt (run to seed) in full sun, and therefore do better in partial shade.
- Only grow what you have space for. If you don't have a large garden you can grow salads in window boxes, pots or growing bags.
- If planting in the ground prepare the soil by removing weeds and adding well-rotted compost or manure, and rake level.
- Don't grow plants too closely together and prick out if necessary always follow the spacing suggestions on the seed packets.
- Deter slugs and snails using barriers such as copper tape. Use wildlifefriendly slug pellets (made using iron phosphate) only as a last resort
- If possible, start off vulnerable plants, such as salad leaves and courgettes, indoors, and plant them out when they're big enough to withstand attack from any bugs and the weather!

Some of the best beginner vegetables to grow are:

1 Beetroot

Beetroot can be sown direct into shallow drills in the soil, and are ready to harvest within a few weeks. You can also eat the young leaves.

2 Salad Leaves

Salad leaves like rocket and oak-leaf lettuce can be sown in pots and harvested on a cut-and-come-again basis, so you don't need to tend the plants for long. There are mixed salad leaf varieties that make a colourful salad.

3 Bush Tomatoes

Bush tomatoes are easier to grow than cordon varieties, as they don't need supporting and their side shoots do not require nipping out. Bush tomatoes grow well in a hanging basket or pot, in a greenhouse and outdoors.

4 Potatoes

Potatoes are easy to grow – simply plant them in the ground or an old compost bag, cover the leaves with soil when they first appear (known as 'earthing up'), and harvest a few weeks later. Early potatoes (planted in early April) can be harvested in July, before hot, humid weather increases the risk of potato blight.

5 Peas

Peas can be easy to grow and compact varieties can be grown in containers. The young tips can be trimmed and added to salads for a delicious spring treat, and are followed by flowers and pods.

6 Radishes

Radish seeds are fairly large, so they are easy to sow and don't need thinning out. They're ready to harvest within just a few weeks.

7 Japanese and Chinese Salad Leaves

Japanese leafy crops such as mizuna and mibuna and Chinese mustard can be grown as cut-and-come-again leaves. They require little attention and will provide you with a variety of flavours, colours and textures to enjoy in stir fries and salads. You can grow them in containers or in the ground.

8 Chillies

Chillies grow well in pots on a window sill or in a warm, sunny position outside. They have similar growing requirements to bush tomatoes and will continue to crop until the first autumn frosts.

9 Courgette

Courgettes can produce much from just a few plants. For the best results, grow your courgettes in fertile ground and water regularly, picking the courgettes when they're no longer than 10cm.

Update from Salhouse Broad....

It's that time of year, when Paul is busily getting the winter works finished and we're gearing up for another busy season. Whatever the season may bring (and who knows in such financially uncertain times!) we will be ready. We are kicking off the season with an Easter trail, it's been a few years since we held the Easter Egg Hunt and after the success of the Halloween trail, we just had to offer something similar over the Easter break. So, keep an eye on social media for details.

If you have been to Salhouse Broad lately, you may have noticed an area of shingle, near to the Hungry Otter. This will be the base for the Dark Skies Viewing Platform and Discovery Hub. We were lucky enough to be chosen as the location for the Dark Skies Platform, which was funded by an EU cross-channel project. The platform will feature wide steps and a big net to lay on and view the night sky, we will be planning some dark skies events using the platform, so keep an eye out for those. The adjoining Discovery Hub is part of a wider project which offers information about the Broads and how Salhouse Broad links into the wider Broads area. Both projects have been led by Norfolk County Council with involvement from The Broads Trust and Love the Broads and will be built by local company; CAPCO.

Due to the ever-increasing cost of everything, we will be raising the parking charges to £1.50 per hour and £4.00 all day. HOWEVER, if you are a regular visitor of ours, you can purchase a yearly permit for just £30. Since introducing parking charges, this price has stayed the same, we will endeavour to keep the yearly permit charge low for regular visitors and if you're interested in buying one of these permits, please see the signs in the car park or contact us in the office on 01603 722775.

This winter our volunteer team have been busy, they have continued with the traditional hedge-laying at the campsite; this will thicken out the hedge at the bottom and promote new growth. They have planted some sea buckthorn near to where the new dark skies platform will be, this should suit the sandy soil and will provide some nice orange berries to help feed the birds and provide a nice contrast to the yellow gorse. They are also working on getting some native species in the 'boggy bit' beside the boardwalk and near to the beach. It will be nice for this area to have a bit of colour and interest, rather than mud! So, watch that space.

This season we will be opening on 1st April and we will be welcoming 4 new Seasonal Rangers to the team, so please say hi to them! Don't forget, The Hungry Otter will be back too, serving their lovely coffees, teas, the best sausage rolls, ice cream (it won't be long before the sun shines!) and more besides. Whether you pop down for a coffee, a dog walk, a paddle or a camp, we will be ready to welcome you.

Spring is around the Corner...

We have now slipped into March, and I must say I am pleased to see the sunshine out, although I did still have to de-ice my car the other day! It's pleasing to see that the evenings are lighter and metrological Spring will be upon us on the 20th March.

How is the property market doing?

From a lending perspective I feel that there is less uncertainty moving forward and although the Bank of England did increase rates last month, we have seen some lenders starting to soften their position and offering deals that make borrowing slightly more attainable.

On the whole, we are finding that prospective buyers who are viewing properties at this time have reset their expectations with regards to borrowing and know the implications if interest rates were to rise, or if they have already done so since their search began.

This means that there are no awkward shocks for purchasers when they start analysing what their monthly outgoings will be upon making an offer!

Property values have fallen since the height of the market midway through last year, the correction in the market appears to be at least 5% and, in some cases, higher.

Taking a step back from the whole situation... Yes, undoubtedly interest rates are higher than they have been for many years although I can remember buying my first home and the mortgage rate then even allowing for a low start rate it was still at a frightening 15%, but let's face it even with the increased rates, mortgages today are still very competitive and what's the alternative to rent! With rental prices surging and available property diminishing, that potential avenue is becoming more difficult to navigate every day!

So, what do I expect moving forward this year?

We certainly feel that taking a balanced view on all of the information to hand that the Spring market will kick in as usual.

So, as we move towards April, valuation levels have increased dramatically, viewing levels will increase still further... we are already experiencing more offers coming in on properties!

In fact, we actually had successful sales months in January and February! So, we are already up and running!!! We expect more moving forward and to put a comparison to the marketplace, I anticipate that we will go back to a marketplace similar to what we were experiencing in mid-2019. Which is a stable period of consolidation, and this will give things a bit more of a chance to settle down.

The good news is we would expect that with the increased levels of buyers and sellers returning to the market for Spring, lending products become more affordable. This will bolster the housing market although we don't expect that house prices will rise anytime soon, more likely they will run flat through this year and potentially rise next year if the economic conditions are right.

Clearly as we said earlier, consolidation is key for housing to recover to allow some buyers priced out of the market to return.

Given the dizzy heights of the post covid lockdown market where a 10% increase was the yearly norm, which of course was always going to be unstainable year on year in the long term, and regardless of that traumatic Autumn budget of last year allied sadly to the war in Ukraine/cost of living rises which fuelled an economic and market slowdown, it was ironically always likely we would have seen the property market slow down naturally towards the end of last year.

Regardless of what went on before, the property market at least looks set to be settled over the rest of this year, with a greater number of available stock of property for sale and settled house prices, so it would appear for those wishing to move or buy their first home it will be a very good time to do so....



EMERGENCY DEFIBRILLATOR (AED) INSTRUCTIONS FOR USE

In the event of a suspected heart attack / chest pains, the following procedure should be used:

- 1. Call 999 and ask for the Ambulance Service
- 2. Tell the Operator the telephone number from where you are calling, and they will tell you the location of the nearest Cabinet, as follows:



Jubilee Hall, Lower Street Salhouse NR13 6RE



The Green, Lower Street, Salhouse NR13 6RY



Station Road Salhouse NR13 6NX



The Recreation Ground Thieves Lane, Salhouse NR13 6RQ

- 3. The Operator will ask a series of questions which you need to answer to the best of your ability. This will only take a few seconds and will not delay the Ambulance.
- 4. THE OPERATOR WILL THEN PROVIDE YOU WITH THE ACCESS CODE TO OPEN THE CABINET
- 5. The Defibrillator and Resuscitation Pack should be removed from the cabinet and the Ambulance Service will stay on the line and give verbal assistance if required.
- 6. Switch on the Defibrillator and IT WILL GIVE YOU VERBAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR USE.
- 7. The Defibrillator cannot be used incorrectly as it will only deliver a shock to the patient if it detects it is necessary.
- 8. There are scissors in the Resuscitation Pack to assist with the removal of clothing and a pocket rescue breath mask to carry out CPR.

REMEMBER – Think SAFETY

Before pushing the button, make sure everyone is clear and shout: "STAND CLEAR - SHOCKING"



Speedwatch seeks Volunteers

Norfolk Police aim to reduce accidents and deaths on our roads and in doing so, in conjunction with the Safety Camera Partnership, have empowered Community Speedwatch. This service enables villages to conduct formalised monitoring of vehicle speeds to maintain road safety.

Salhouse has participated in this service since 2008 by conducting observations at approved locations within the parish. This is based on a group of trained volunteers observing traffic at

random times to monitor traffic speeds and record those over proscribed limits.


