From the Editor

Dear Readers,

Something in the air? In October we had two or three nights when the Northern Lights, or Aurora Borealis, could be clearly and spectacularly seen in our relatively southern latitude. Lots of people were out late at night with their cameras trying to capture the phenomenon, and many were successful. Thanks very much to Richard Bendy for supplying the image on this issue's front cover, and yes, it was actually taken in Salhouse.

Also in October, we witnessed a sonic boom late one morning. It shook doors and windows in our house, and in fact over a wide area of East Anglia. Going outside and looking for the culprit was pointless, so I logged on to 'flightradar24.com', and sure enough, there was an RAF Typhoon from Coningsby heading SE over Norwich at high speed. On the same screen could be seen an Air India passenger jet, supposedly heading for Heathrow, but for some reason flying in concentric circles over the eastern Norfolk Broads. The connection between these two was not immediately obvious, but it turned out in news reports later there had been a bomb scare on board the airliner and the fighters had been sent out to rapidly intercept it. Why was it instructed to circle over Norfolk? Probably because they thought nobody lives here.

Here in Salhouse, we sometimes get the impression our skies are really busy, with the regular helicopter traffic and planes passing over low on the approach to Norwich airport. We also have the RAF Airbus Atlas transport planes that can be seen some mornings practicing their landing approach at Norwich, presumably before heading back to Brize Norton in time for lunch. But check on the radar any other time and you will see that in reality Norfolk and Suffolk are very quiet in terms of air traffic, compared to the area around Stansted for example, not that far away. We are really very lucky.

I hope you enjoy this Winter 2024 edition of the Salhouse Saga.

Sadly, we received Lynn Yallop's resignation from the PC. We would like to thank Lynn for her commitment, help and guidance and being part of the GT16 working group while she served as a Parish Councillor.

The PC has 11 seats, of which 9 are filled, which leaves 2 vacancies – so if you are interested in serving your local community; would like to make a difference; and be involved in shaping the future of your local Community, why not step forward and apply to fulfil this valuable and rewarding voluntary role. At the October Parish Council meeting it was reported that livestock in Salhouse had been attacked by dogs, sadly one ram had to be destroyed, and another was badly injured. This is both upsetting and costly for the owner.

Please remember your **responsibilities as a dog owner**; Norfolk County Council, which manages the public rights of way, gives the following guidance:

- You may take your dog with you on a public right of way, provided that it is kept on a lead or is otherwise under close control and remains on the Public Right of Way.
- It is an offence to have a dog off a lead or not under close control in a field in which there are sheep. A landowner may shoot a dog that is out of control and attacking livestock.
- If a dog injures a person, animal or property, the owner or person in charge of the dog may be liable for damages.
- Should your dog foul a path, please clean up after it, using dog bins if provided. It is an offence to allow your dog to foul a footpath and you may face a fine if you let them do so.

Please keep dogs under close control and on paths at all times. If they are not trained to recall, they should be on a lead. Do not let them run free where there are livestock or horses, or across crops. If you want to let your dog run off a lead there is now a dog park on Honeycombe Road. It is fully fenced in and a perfect opportunity to let your dog run safely off the lead.

Salhouse, Rackheath and Wroxham Parish Councils recently met with Taylor Wimpey to be advised of the latest **GT16 North Rackheath /Salhouse development** update.

A public consultation closed at the end of October and as a PC we have sent in comments and concerns and wait to hear the next steps.

On 4th October we received a representative from **Community Heartbeat** at Jubilee Hall. As we have four defibrillators in the village, at the triangle on Lower Street, at the Pavillion on Thieves Lane, outside Jubilee Hall and on Station Road, we invited Community Heartbeat to give a talk and demonstration on their usage.

Dot, the representative, was very informative with an easy going manner, but gave a detailed and knowledgeable talk and at the end answered any questions that arose. We like to think anyone who attended came away reassured of what to do, should the need arise.

If you would be interested in attending a future defibrillator awareness session please contact the Clerk and when we have enough interest we will look to arrange a session.

The PC is pleased to support the Jubilee Hall in its **Christmas Fayre and Light Switch-On** event being held on 30th November 2024 – another lovely opportunity for the Parish to

come together.

Remembrance Day is upon us once more and it is an honour and a privilege to lay a poppy wreath on behalf of the village to those who gave the ultimate sacrifice. County and District Councillors' Report

Fran Whymark and Martin Murrell

One of the main policies from the new government is building 1.5 million new homes over the next 5 years. This is a heady aspiration for any government, directly impacting Broadland District Council. To do this there will be a need to make significant changes to the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and the planning system generally. In the Greater Norwich area (Broadland, Norwich and South Norfolk) this would mean building over 700 extra houses per year. To achieve this there will be a greater presumption in favour of development. Something that could see mandatory targets forced upon local authorities and the distinct possibility of a 'new town' in Norfolk.

The English Devolution Bill is making its way through Parliament. The Norfolk Devolution Deal (and Suffolk Deal) has been halted by the new Labour Government. This Bill will make devolution the default setting, so what this will mean for Norfolk we cannot be sure. Perhaps Norfolk and Suffolk will be pushed into a Mayoral Combined Authority? Currently we have no clear indication of what any new deal will look like, or when.

The One Million Trees for Norfolk subsidised tree scheme is now open for individuals, parish councils, community groups, businesses, schools and landowners to apply for tree packs at up to 50% off. These can be packs for hedgerows, small and large trees, including Norfolk Oaks. Search 'trees' on the NCC website and go to '1 Million Trees for Norfolk'. Currently nearly 500k have been planted across Norfolk and the aim is for 150k per year and 600k or more by March 2025.

As of 18th November there will be a booking system at Norfolk recycling centres. The aim is that traders and residents will experience a better service, with less congestion and staff available to help customers needing assistance. Bookings for 15 minute slots can be made from 11th November for visits up to seven days ahead, online via the NCC website or by phoning the customer service centre. Slots can be cancelled or changed at any time, right up to the time of the booking.

NCC have awarded new Park and Ride contracts, starting in 2025 for up to eight years. Meaning more buses, including services on a Sunday. Sprowston is being opened to local buses and will be used as a transport hub, seeing additional services using this hub. This will include the Pink

Line, running between Hoveton and Hethersett, via the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital.

We are pleased to tell you that the Rackheath Medical Centre is now in the process of being built. The GPs and medical team will be provided by the Hoveton and Wroxham Medical Practice when it opens in the summer of 2025. We are also working on getting a pharmacy, dentist and optician services nearby.

Last, we wanted to make you all aware of a scam regarding registering with a 'new' dentist. Many of us have had trouble getting an NHS dentist. Recently people have been contacted and asked to pay £20 to register at a new dentist, which many have done. The 'dentist' turned out to be an empty shop on the Reepham Rd, Hellesdon. You will never be asked to pay to register with an NHS dentist.

At Broadland District Council the Help Hub is always there to help anyone needing extra support. Getting help early can stop things reaching crisis point. For more information go to: www.southnorfolkandbroadland.gov.uk/help-hub,

From the Churchwarden

The churchyard is now looking wonderfully tidy and well managed, thanks to a great initial start made by a small working party of villagers (thank you!) and recently thanks to the amazing effort of Community Payback volunteers, who were really keen to make a positive difference. They were given a warm welcome, teas, coffees and biscuits and a short talk about the church and churchyard on the first day to better understand why their contribution was so important and appreciated. Going forwards, we look forward to working with them regularly, with full churchyard cuts every August and October. This is after our rare wildflowers have been and gone, although the churchyard will be managed with a view to ensuring ongoing ease of access with cut pathways.



On Remembrance Sunday, along with wreathes on the War Memorial, a new Remembrance Poppy was placed in front of the headstone of Ernest Fox, our only Commonwealth War Grave. Many of you may have seen the sign by the lychgate, but wondered where, or who, it was. Ernest died at Aldershot barracks in October 1918 of the Spanish flu, the global pandemic of its day. Sara 'Ski' Cator

Sara 'Ski' Cator of Broad Farm, Salhouse passed away on 5th August 2024 at the age of 70 years. A private funeral took place at Woodbastwick Church and a



Service of Thanksgiving was held at Norwich Cathedral on 20th September, attended by more than 500 people.

Born Sara Keeling (hence 'Ski') in Chelsea, London, on 5th July 1954, she was daughter to her now elderly mother Biddy (sadly too frail to travel), sister to PJ (Patrick, her younger brother), wife to her darling Henry, loving mother to Nog (Henrietta), Brini (Sabrina) and Tom, mother-inlaw to Will and granny/Gugu to Arthur and Charlotte.

Ski had a heart of gold and was a quite remarkable woman – her energy, strength of character, warmth, friendship, integrity, common-sense, practicality and all with that wickedly dry sense of humour and fun, shone through in everything she did.

Ski was educated at Woldingham School in Surrey and in Italy, and trained as a Montessori teacher. She married Henry Cator on 6th February 1982. They started their married life at Dyes Farm where Nog was born. They moved to Hill Farm, Salhouse in 1985. Charlotte was born October that year but sadly died of a cot death in March 1986. Brini came along in January 1987 and Tom in October 1989. In August 1992 they all moved to Broad Farm, Salhouse, an idyllic childhood home for the young family.

Her loyal and total support of Henry in all his various endeavours was an example to us all. She was the ultimate home-maker, whether for herself or others. She created such a warm and loving home for Henry and her three bears of whom she was so fiercely loving, supportive and protective. Her grandchildren described their Gugu in a few words — beautiful, brave, loving, kind, wonderful and Gugu-ish — what better descriptors could anyone wish for?

Ski was a Magistrate for 38 years --a remarkable record of public service. She took the Judicial Oath in 1986. That was a time when male magistrates still well outnumbered women. One of the men on the interview panel asked Ski: "If we appoint you, how do we know you won't go and get yourself pregnant!"

"Oh you don't need to worry about that," Ski gaily replied. "I already am !"



She was appointed a Chair in the Adult Court. A similar role followed in the Youth Court; and a little later still Ski became Deputy Chair of the Youth Panel itself. That was a role especially close to Ski's heart. She believed that if you were lucky, your decisions might just help some young offenders into calmer waters.

It wasn't all plain sailing though. In one case Ski dealt quite severely with a young man for several offences. He retaliated by saying, "You're just an old ****." Ski's response defused the situation and also entered local magistrates' folk law. She immediately shot back: "Now look here young man that was unpleasant, if you don't mind not so much of the old."

Her work as a magistrate made good use of her skills: energy, compassion, organisation and humour. In 2011 she was <u>elected</u> Chair of the 350 strong Norwich Bench in what was a milestone year, for she was the very last person to hold that position; after 500 years, the Bench in its various guises was soon to disappear into a new County-wide Bench.

Closer to home, she served as a School Governor at Salhouse School for a number of years.

In whatever Ski did, starting at home, she was always not only terrifyingly organised, she was never afraid to face up to difficult situations, being the first to call a spade a spade and had the best moral compass.

Thanks to Henry Cator for providing transcripts of the eulogies read at the Memorial Service to be reproduced here.

Across the school, there has been a real buzz of learning this term as the children strive to "soar on wings" (Isaiah 40:31).

In Fledglings, our youngest learners have created their own family trees as part of the topic 'all about me'.

In Coots class, pupils have been using a range of resources to explore number bonds to ten as part of their learning in maths.

In Bitterns class, the children have enjoyed using different sketching techniques to create a range of textures in observational drawings.

In Kingfishers class, pupils have taken ownership of their space to develop an area for reading for pleasure.

In Grebes class, the group have investigated how the lives of children have changed over time - stretching as far back as 15,000 years ago!

In Herons class, students have been learning about the lives of Viking citizens and even created their own Viking Sagas; which they performed in front of their peers.

NHS Health Checks

We welcome all of our eligible patients to consider having an NHS health check. If you have previously been invited but did not take up the offer, it is not too late. Please contact the surgery and ask for a health check appointment.

What is an NHS Health Check?

The NHS Health Check is a free check-up of your overall health. It can tell you whether you're at higher risk of getting certain health problems, such as:

heart disease

diabetes

kidnev disease

stroke

During the check-up you'll discuss how to reduce your risk of these conditions.

If you're aged over 65, you'll also be told about <u>symptoms of dementia</u> to look out for.

Who is the NHS Health Check for?

The check is for people who are aged 40 to 74 who do not have any of the following pre-existing conditions:

- heart disease
- chronic kidney disease
- diabetes
- high blood pressure (hypertension)
- atrial fibrillation
- transient ischaemic attack
- inherited high cholesterol (familial hypercholesterolemia)
- heart failure
- peripheral arterial disease
- stroke
- currently being prescribed statins to lower cholesterol
- previous checks have found that you have a 20% or higher risk of getting cardiovascular disease over the next 10 years

You should have regular check-ups if you have one of these conditions. Your care team will be able to give you more information about this.

Bringing unused drugs back to dispensary for safe disposal

Our patient participation group and our Dispensary lead Charlotte Watlow is running a campaign to help people to dispose of the medications they may have at home that they know they will not use.

This very successful campaign has featured in the Eastern Daily Press and on Radio Norfolk.

Many people have found it very helpful to have a place to bring unused drugs. There is a silver bin in the entrance to the surgery. Please do not leave any drug packs in the boat. The boat is being used to help to remind people to bring in their unused drugs.

The drugs cannot be used by the practice as they have been dispensed already but the dispensary team can help you to dispose of the drugs (tablets, liquid, injectables, gels and creams) safely and in an environmentally friendly way. Please do not put unwanted medication down the sink or the toilet as this not only affects us humans, but also affects our wildlife.

The Patient Participation Group

We have an active Patient Participation Group (PPG) to whom we are very grateful.

The group has been very helpful in organising;-

Health and Wellbeing events,

Marshalling at Flu /Covid clinics

And recently coming up with a "medication amnesty" helping patients to return unwanted drugs.

The PPG is currently looking to form a virtual group. All patients and carers at the practice are eligible to join. The group will be sent items of interest by email or text for comment. The virtual group may also be asked from time to time to help at events.

The NHS app

The NHS app can be downloaded on your phone.

What you can do with the NHS App

- order repeat prescriptions and nominate a pharmacy where you would like to collect them
- book and manage appointments
- view your GP health record to see information like your allergies and medicines (if your GP has given you access to your detailed medical record, you can also see information like test results)
- book and manage COVID-19 vaccinations
- register your organ donation decision
- choose how the NHS uses your data
- view your NHS number (find out what your NHS number is)
- use NHS 111 online to answer questions and get instant advice or medical help near you

Before proving who you are, you can use the NHS App to:

- search trusted NHS information and advice on hundreds of conditions and treatments
- find NHS services near you

Please note that you may have items on repeat that do not appear on your app. This may be due to a review needing to take place by our clinical team to allow more issues, it has been issued recently or it is simply out of sync with the remainder of your items. Please use the additional comments box at the bottom of the form when ordering your medication, to request the item(s) that do not appear or any acute medication that you may need.

New telephone system

We have had a new telephone upgrade. What this means for you is that at busy times of the week if you cannot use the website or NHS app but you have been informed by the telephone message that there is a queue you can now request a call back. This is proving popular but please do try to remain in mobile phone range whilst you wait for the call back and ensure your ringer is set to on so that you do not miss the call.



Glen, Mark, David, and Joan spent a lot of time down Salhouse Broad, swimming and playing on the Waterwitch, enjoying the way it used to be back then with cattle roaming and having picnics on the short grass by the bluebell woodland.

WINTER GARDENING

How to plant bulbs for a spring display:

It's not too late to plant a few bulbs; come next spring, you will have a display that that will last for weeks and provide early pollen for emerging bees and insects. You could plant a pot of spring bulbs as a unique Christmas gift for friends and family.

It's quick and easy. You could plant a single type of bulb, or be more adventurous and try several different bulbs in layers, known as a bulb lasagne. You'll get even more flower power in a small space.



How to make a bulb lasagne:

You need to arrange the layers with the largest, latest-flowering bulbs such as tulips or pheasant's eye narcissi at the bottom, followed by a middle layer of daffodils. The smallest bulbs with the earliest flowers, such as crocuses or irises go in the final layer.

You will need:

- Large container with drainage holes
- Broken pieces of pot to cover the drainage hole
- A selection of spring-flowering bulbs, such as crocuses, irises, daffodils and tulips
- Peat-free multi-purpose compost and potting grit.

How to plant bulbs in a pot in five easy steps:

- 1 Choose a large pot. Make sure it is at least 30cm (1ft) wide and deep, with drainage holes in the base. If there's just one large drainage hole, cover it with a few pieces of broken pot, to stop the compost washing out. You can use either home-made garden or commercially produced peat-free composts.
- Add compost. Place at least 10cm (4in) of compost in the bottom of the pot, with some potting grit. Bulbs like good drainage. Then arrange your first layer of bulbs on top, pointed end upwards. You can space them quite closely, a bulb's width apart, to fit in as many as possible.
- 3 **Cover the bulbs**. Add more compost to cover the bulbs completely, and firm down gently. Then position your next layer of bulbs in a similar way to the first and cover with more compost.
- 4 **If you still have plenty of room**, you can add a third layer of bulbs. Then finish with a final 5–10cm (2–4in) layer of compost. Firm it gently, making sure the surface is at least 2cm (1in) below the rim.
- 5 **Spread a thick layer of gravel or potting grit** over the surface to deter weeds, then water well to settle the compost. Place the pot outdoors in a warm, sunny spot and the first shoots will start to appear in early spring. Make sure the pot is not waterlogged and don't let it get too wet over the winter.

Aftercare

- Water the container regularly once the shoots begin to emerge in spring. Take care not to let the compost get too wet – most bulbs prefer good drainage.
- Deadhead the faded flowers, so the plants don't waste energy producing seeds.
- Allow the leaves to die down naturally, so they can replenish the bulbs for flowering next year.
- After flowering, move the container to a less prominent position until the following spring, or replant the bulbs into your borders.

If such a person does not comply, then there are fines which can be levied. It is a difficult system to enforce, of course, as evidence is needed to prosecute offenders.

Team Salhouse has previously advertised an email address which may be used to report instances of dog fouling and, once reported with details of location and a picture if possible, will endeavour to clear it up.

Salhouse Tree Steward

The Salhouse Community Tree Nursery has over 600 trees and shrubs ready for planting out this winter which are offered for free to local and surrounding villagers, organisations, and landowners.



Small trees and shrubs are provided, typically 1-2 years old and around 30cm tall. While they may not look much, they will establish well and are easier to plant than a 6' tall tree. We also have a limited stock of second-hand guards but no stakes or canes. Protection is essential in a setting where you know deer, rabbits or voles are present.

Stock we have include Beech, Cherry plum, Mirabelle, Chinese dogwood, Common dogwood, Field maple, Holly, Lime (not for the G&T!), Oak, Rowan, Spindle, Whitebeam, Wild cherry, and Wild Service. There are others too. For an up-to-date stock list, questions or requests please email me on the address below.

If you want to grow something edible in the garden, I would recommend Cherry plum or Mirabelle which are a small/medium tree with white spring blossom and sweet stoned desert fruits in late summer. The fruit of Chinese dogwood (Cornus mas) is also edible (I've yet to try these so can only trust what Google says).

For autumn colour Field Maple turns yellow, Guelder rose - bright red, and dogwood - dark red.

If you are thinking about planting trees I would be happy to provide advice on species, layouts, designs and applying for grant funding. Together we can make Salhouse a greener, more beautiful place to live.

In the New Year I will be re-starting volunteering sessions at the Nursery to help cultivate the new batches of seeds. If this is of interest, do send me an email for updates on future volunteering dates.



The season kicked off in the early spring, but Mother Nature kept us on our toes. Rainy days and temperamental skies meant a slow start. The natural beauty of Salhouse Broad is something we're committed to preserving, and this winter, our dedicated volunteer team has two significant projects lined up. Each project is designed to maintain and enhance the area's unique ecosystem, ensuring that Salhouse Broad remains a thriving habitat for wildlife and a scenic retreat for visitors.

First on the agenda is our annual willow clearance, focused on the east side of the main path. Over time, willow growth can overtake areas

that would otherwise be filled with reedbed—a vital habitat for numerous bird species and other wildlife. By removing the excess willow, we allow the reedbed to flourish, enhancing biodiversity and improving the view from the path. Last winter's clearing efforts have already paid off, as visitors now enjoy a widened vista from the main path.

Additionally, we'll be engaging in reed cutting. Reedbeds play a crucial role in maintaining the wetland ecosystem, but without proper management, they can become bogged down by leaf litter and invasive plants. Our team's work will ensure the reeds remain in optimal condition, preventing buildup and preserving the wet environment that makes the Broad so special.

Though winter is only beginning, we're already excited about what next season will bring. Each year, we strive to offer events that engage our community, conservation efforts that protect our natural habitats, and a welcoming environment for everyone who steps foot on the Broad. We're thrilled by the support we receive from visitors and volunteers, all of whom make Salhouse Broad a place to cherish and protect.

So, here's to another season, and to many more to come. Whether you're an avid stargazer, a nature enthusiast, or simply someone who loves a peaceful walk in the woods, we look forward to seeing you at Salhouse Broad.

Salhouse Station Group - Saving the Waiting Room

Our recent work has been towards turning Salhouse Station Group into a formal entity which will allow us to seek funding and move the project forwards. It involves quite a lot of work, from writing a business plan to updating our constitution and carrying through with the legal process to establish us as a formal body. Once we have completed this we will be starting fund raising and grant applications in earnest, and will be holding more meetings to ensure the communities who will be the key station users and our partners can be fully updated and involved.

At the same time that we were seeking to prevent demolition of the waiting room building, a similar project was being pursued in Brandon in Suffolk. We attended their second meeting last week [see image A] and were able to share ideas. Whilst their paperwork is not as advanced as ours, they have now had an approach from a local businessman to provide some matched funding. The scale of their project is far in excess of ours - possibly around £3.5 million - but we share many of the same issues.

Interestingly Brandon station is actually in Weeting, over the border in Norfolk and part of their work will be to look at renaming the station 'Brandon and Weeting'.



Since launching on Broadland's Community at Heart Lottery [see image B], we have raised more than £300 through ticket sales and, as a newly signed up good cause, were the lucky winners of an additional £500 in their third birthday celebratory draw.

We have recently seen a 10% increase in ticket sales too. The Community at Heart Lottery is a great way of supporting local causes whilst having a chance to win prizes of up to £25k. 


Image C: ORR Annual Passenger Numbers at Small Stations Along the Bittern

A Time to Sell



I don't like to be the one who brings up the "C" word, but I find myself bracing myself every time I walk into the supermarket these days, wondering if Christmas carols will be playing yet!





EMERGENCY DEFIBRILLATOR (AED) INSTRUCTIONS FOR USE

In the event of a suspected heart attack / chest pains, the following procedure should be used:

- 1. Call 999 and ask for the Ambulance Service
- 2. Tell the Operator the telephone number from where you are calling, and they will tell you the location of the nearest Cabinet, as follows:



Jubilee Hall, Lower Street Salhouse NR13 6RE



The Green, Lower Street, Salhouse NR13 6RY



Station Road Salhouse NR13 6NX



The Recreation Ground Thieves Lane, Salhouse NR13 6RQ

- 3. The Operator will ask a series of questions which you need to answer to the best of your ability. This will only take a few seconds and will not delay the Ambulance.
- 4. THE OPERATOR WILL THEN PROVIDE YOU WITH THE ACCESS CODE TO OPEN THE CABINET
- 5. The Defibrillator and Resuscitation Pack should be removed from the cabinet and the Ambulance Service will stay on the line and give verbal assistance if required.
- 6. Switch on the Defibrillator and IT WILL GIVE YOU VERBAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR USE.
- 7. The Defibrillator cannot be used incorrectly as it will only deliver a shock to the patient if it detects it is necessary.
- 8. There are scissors in the Resuscitation Pack to assist with the removal of clothing and a pocket rescue breath mask to carry out CPR.

REMEMBER - Think SAFFTY

Before pushing the button, make sure everyone is clear and shout:

"STAND CLEAR - SHOCKING"

Speedwatch Seeks Volunteers



Norfolk Police aim to reduce accidents and deaths on our roads and in doing so, in conjunction with the Safety Camera Partnership, have empowered Community Speedwatch. This service enables villages to conduct formalised monitoring of vehicle speeds to maintain road safety.

Salhouse has participated in this service since 2008 by conducting observations at approved locations within the parish. This is based on a group of trained volunteers observing traffic at random times to monitor traffic speeds and record those over prescribed limits.
